GAME DAY NOTABLES

- Michigan plays at Boston University for its first road game of the 2005-06 season. It also marks just the second time in the five-game series the Wolverines will play a game in Boston, Mass.
- Michigan has played five total games against Boston University in the all-time series with the Wolverines holding a 3-2 all-time advantage.
- Michigan has lost the last two games against Boston University, both of which were played at Crisler Arena in Ann Arbor, Mich. The Maize and Blue lost 63-52 last year (Dec. 14, 2004) and two seasons ago, 61-60 (Dec. 30, 2003).
- Michigan plays in Boston, Mass., for the first time since the 1999-2000 season. The last time U-M was on the east coast was at Boston College (Dec. 19, 1999). U-M lost 89-71 against Eagles.
- With Michigan heading to Boston University, it marks the homecoming for east coast natives Courtney Sims and Kendric Price. Both were stars in the Independent School League as Sims played at the Noble & Greenough School and Price at the Buckingham Browne & Nichols School.
- In the season-opener against Central Michigan, Courtney Sims finished the game with a game-high 20 points after a career-high nine field goals. He finished the game going 9-for-10 from the field, with six rebounds, two blocks and a steal. With that performance, he has back-to-back 20-plus point performances dating back to the last game of last season when Sims had a career-high 25 points against Northwestern in the Big Ten Tournament.
- Both Lester Abram and Daniel Horton returned to the Michigan line-up against Central Michigan after missing significant time in 2004-05. Abram, who had 19 points, redshirted the season after undergoing shoulder surgery, while Horton, who had three points, four rebounds and four assists, missed to a knee injury and team suspension.
- Graham Brown had a career-high-tying 11 rebounds in the season-opener against Central Michigan.
- Jerret Smith opened his Michigan career in fine style recording nine assists to go along with his eight points. Those nine dimes are the most by a freshman since Daniel Horton had nine against IUPUI (Jan. 4, 2003), which was his 13th career game.

It also reflects vacating the 1992 Final Four appearance; the 1997 NIT championship; 1993, 1996 and 1998 NCAA Tournament appearances; and the 1998 Big Ten Tournament championship.

TEAM ANNOUNCEMENTS

The Michigan basketball program will posthumously honor NCAA All-American Bill Buntin (1963-65) by retiring his jersey, No. 22, in a halftime ceremony during the Wolverines' Big Ten Conference home opener against Purdue (Jan. 6). Buntin becomes the fifth player in Michigan history to have his jersey to hang in the Crisler Arena rafters, joining Cazzie Russell (1964-66), whose jersey was retired Dec. 11, 1993; Rudy Tomjanovich (1967-70), whose jersey was retired Feb. 8, 2003; Phil Hubbard (1975-79), whose jersey was retired Jan. 11, 2004 and Glen Rice (1986-89), whose jersey was retired Feb. 20, 2005. Buntin's family and teammates will take part in the ceremony.

Michigan announced junior Brent Petway will miss the fall semester of the basketball season due to academic ineligibility. Petway will be allowed to practice but cannot participate in games during the first semester. Petway has played in 62 career games with five starts. He averaged 5.4 points, 4.4 rebounds and 1.2 blocks while shooting 60.4 percent from the field in his two seasons with the Wolverines.

The Wolverines opened the season holding their annual Maize and Blue Scrimmage. In addition to the game itself, which was a thrilling 53-50 overtime win for the Maize squad, the event took on more meaning as the Wolverines raised \$960 for Hurricane victims. Fans generously donated money as they took in the scrimmage, got autographs, won raffle prizes and watched the Wolverine football team's 33-17 victory over Northwestern on the big screens at Crisler Arena.

The Michigan basketball program and Sports Talk 1050 WTKA have teamed up for a third season of the Michigan Basketball Assistant Coaches Show. During the 2005-06 season, WTKA will host the Michigan Basketball Assistant Coaches Show, scheduled from 7 to 8 p.m. Along with WTKA Sports Beat in the Afternoon host Dennis Fithian, a U-M assistant coach -- Chuck Swenson, Andrew Moore or Mike Jackson -- will join Fithian to discuss Michigan Basketball throughout the course of the season. ESPN will be conducting a "Pride of the Program" series throughout the 2005-06 season. It features all 326 Division I college basketball programs and highlight a significant moment in each program's history. For the Wolverines, their feature will air Wednesday, Feb. 1. The U-M moment will show the Wolverines capturing the program's first national title in 1989. Coached by interim coach Steve Fisher, and led by the Tournament's Most Outstanding Player, Glen Rice (31 pts), U-M won its first national title after Rumeal Robinson sealed the win for Michigan by hitting two clutch free throws with :03 left in overtime to clinch the win 80-79.

TEAM NOTABLES

Michigan opened the 2005-06 season with an exhibition game against Grand Valley State (Nov. 5). After building a 24-point lead, the Wolverines held off the late charge from the Lakers, who cut it the lead to eight with five minutes left, to win 77-69. The Maize and Blue were paced by four players scoring in double figures including Daniel Horton's 23, Chris Hunter's 15, Graham Brown's 12 and Lester Abram's 10. For the game, the Wolverines shot 54.2 percent from the field.

Michigan dominated its second exhibition with a 101-56 win over Northern Michigan (Nov. 11). Six Wolverines scored in double figures with Ron Coleman leading the way with 17 points, including 15 in the second half. Dion Harris chipped in with 14-points, while leading U-M with five assists and no turnovers. Daniel Horton had another fine exhibition performance with 12 points, four assists and five steals in the game. Graham Brown had 12 points to go along with his seven rebounds and two steals, while Courtney Sims matched Brown's tallies as he also recorded 12 points and seven rebounds in the contest.

For the first time in Michigan basketball history, the Maize and Blue have elected four players to serve as captain for the upcoming 2005-06 season. Seniors Lester Abram, Graham Brown, Sherrod Harrell and Chris Hunter were all selected in a team vote prior to the 2005 Basketball Awards Celebration. Abram, Brown and Harrell will all serve as captain for their second straight season after serving as tri-captains in 2004-05. Prior to this season's quad captains, the Wolverines have had no more than three players serve as captain in the 89 years of Michigan Basketball. The Maize and Blue have had tri-captains a total of four times - 1999-2000, 2000-01, 2002-03 and 2004-05.

MICHIGAN BASKETBALL GAME NOTES

Throughout 2004-05, Michigan lost 86 total games due to injuries and other various reasons. The Maize and Blue used 16 different lineups in 31 games in 2004-05 and did not have a single game the entire season with every player at Tommy Amaker's disposal.

Injuries plagued Michigan during the entire 2004-05 season. The most severe loss was Lester Abram, who was out for the year following left shoulder surgery (Dec. 16, 2004). The list of significant injuries throughout the 2004-05 season included: Daniel Horton (four weeks, knee sprain), Graham Brown (four and a half weeks, hernia) and Dani Wohl (four weeks, elbow). Chris Hunter (eight games, right ankle), Brent Petway (two games, shoulder), Amadou Ba (two games, knee and four games, lower back), Ashtyn Bell (five games, broken nose) and Alex Brzozowicz (four games, right ankle) all missed games due to injury.

Dion Harris and Courtney Sims have yet to miss a game for the Maize and Blue. In three seasons, the duo has played in 66 straight games apiece. Sims has 58 career starts while Harris has 42.

In the season-opener against Central Michigan, the Wolverines held the Chippewas to just 60 total points. In 2004-05, Michigan has held teams at or below 65 points in 19 of 31 games. The Wolverines held Binghamton (Nov. 15, 2004) to the lowest total of the season with 46 points.

INDIVIDUAL NOTES

SENIOR WING LESTER ABRAM

Lester Abram was named one of four captains by his teammates for the 2005-06 season. He joins Graham Brown, Sherrod Harrell and Chris Hunter as the program's first quad-captain appointment.

Lester Abram missed the 28 games of the 2004-05 season following surgery (Dec. 16, 2004) for a left shoulder injury. Abram, who played in only three games, applied for and was granted a medical hardship (redshirt) to regain an additional year of eligibility. Abram has played in 64 career games for the Wolverines with 54 starts. He has averaged 11.6 points, 4.3 rebounds, 1.3 assists and 1.0 steals for his career.

Lester Abram returned to the floor after missing 28 games as a junior due to injury. In his first game back, he had 19 points on 7-for-10 shooting against Central Michigan. He added a rebound, a block and a steal in 32 minutes of action.

Lester Abram has scored in double figures in 39 of 65 career games, currently holding a 763 career-point total for the Maize and Blue. He is 237 points away from become the 40th Wolverine scoring 1,000 career points.

Lester Abram has been a big asset to the Wolverines when up at the free throw line. He set the U-M freshman-class top mark shooting 85.6 percent, coming back the following season to tie Cazzie Russell's sophomore-class mark with an 84.3 percentage. To start the 2005-06 season, Abram went 4-for-4 from the line against Central Michigan. Overall, Abram is second all-time at Michigan with an 85.4 career free throw percentage.

SENIOR CENTER AMADOU BA

For two straight years, Amadou Ba has been named as U-M's Travis Conlan Sportsmanship Award winner for his dedication and work ethic for the Wolverine program. He has played in 11 career games for the Wolverines.

SENIOR FORWARD GRAHAM BROWN

Graham Brown was named one of four captains by his teammates for the 2005-06 season. He joins Lester Abram, Sherrod Harrell and Chris Hunter as the program's first quad-captain appointment.

The "Maize Rage," U-M's student crowd, has made Graham Brown its second Wolverine to earn a nickname. Brown is affectionately known as "Moose" to the Maize and Blue faithful. However, Brown prefers the nickname "Hambone" given to him by his father, Rich, when he was a small boy. The Maize Rage's first dubbing was "Air Georgia" for Brent Petway.

During the 2004-05 season, Graham Brown missed nine total games due to injury. Brown missed his first career game against Sacramento State (Nov. 19, 2004), snapping a 66-straight game streak, after sitting out the game as a precautionary measure after suffering a concussion against Colorado (Nov. 17, 2004) in the second round of the Preseason NIT. He missed an additional eight games following surgery to correct a reoccurring hernia (Dec. 7, 2004 to Jan. 8, 2005).

Graham Brown continued to be one of the most reliable players on the Wolverines squad. In addition to his screens, diving for loose balls, and grittiness that most opponents have to try and match, he continued to be solid in the stat department, shooting 56.0 percent from the field and averaging 5.2 points and 4.6 rebounds throughout his career.

For the second time in his career, Graham Brown recorded 11 rebounds in a game. In the season-opener against Central Michigan, Brown tied his career mark with 11 boards. He set the mark with 11 at Indiana (Jan. 19, 2005). He now has 403 career rebounds and needs just 97 to join U-M's 33-member 500 career-rebound club.

With nine points against Minnesota (Feb. 2), Graham Brown reached and surpassed the 400-point mark for his career. Brown currently has 454 career points for a 5.2 per game average. He has nine career games scoring in double figures.

FIFTH-YEAR SENIOR GUARD HAYES GROOMS

After transferring to Michigan and then walking on to the Wolverine squad, Hayes Grooms will be able to play his final season after having to sit out due to NCAA transfer rules last season. Prior to Michigan, Grooms played three years at Lamar University. He played in 62 games and averaging 1.5 points, 0.8 rebounds and 1.1 assists in his time at Lamar.

SENIOR GUARD SHERROD HARRELL

Sherrod Harrell was named one of four captains by his teammates for the 2005-06 season. He joins Lester Abram, Graham Brown and Chris Hunter as the program's first quad-captain appointment.

Sherrod Harrell started 12 games in 2004-05 after the Wolverine perimeter was riddled with injuries. With the extra time on the floor, Harrell tripled his playing time from 13.9 minutes as a junior compared to 4.5 as a sophomore. He set a career-high 31 minutes of action against Illinois (Feb. 8, 2005). He played in 20 or more minutes in seven games in 2004-05.

Sherrod Harrell upped his scoring production on many fronts in 2004-05. Harrell has become more accurate from the field, shooting 34.7 percent from the field compared to just 9.1 percent in 2003-04. The senior captain also upped his points-per-game total as he averaged 1.9 per game compared to his 2003-04 total of 0.2.

Sherrod Harrell set several career bests during the 2004-05 season. He scored a career-high seven points against South Florida (Dec. 11, 2004) before matching it against Minnesota (Feb. 2, 2005). He had a career-high five rebounds against South Florida (Dec. 11, 2004) and a career-high three assists against Boston University (Dec. 14, 2004) and then against at Wisconsin (Feb. 16, 2005).

SENIOR GUARD DANIEL HORTON

Against Northwestern (Jan. 12, 2005), Daniel Horton became the 39th Wolverine to collect 1,000 career points. Needing 24 points to reach the U-M historic list, he finished the first half scoring just five points before tallying 19 in the second stanza to finish the game with 24 points and 1,000 for his career. He hit the 1,000th point on a free throw with 57 seconds remaining.

MICHIGAN BASKETBALL GAME NOTES

Currently, Horton has 1,036 career points, which is 37th all-time.

With three points against Central Michigan (Nov. 18, 2005), Daniel Horton stayed in 37th place on U-M's all-time scoring list with 1,036 career points. He needs just three-points to pass Thad Garner (1979-82), who is 36th with 1,039 career points. For Horton's career he is averaging 13.3 points a game and has 11 20-plus point games, including a career high of 31 points against Purdue (Feb. 19, 2003). He has scored in double figures in 57 of 78 career games

Daniel Horton dished off a career-best 10 assists at Penn State (Jan. 15). With that total, he reached and surpassed the 300-assist mark in his career. Horton currently holds 314 career assists, which is 28 away from cracking the top-10, trailing Dave Baxter (1975-78), who holds 10th with 342. Horton has recorded five or more assists in 33 career games and is averaging 4.0 a game for his career.

After draining two triples against Wisconsin (Jan. 22), Daniel Horton has 162 career three-point field goals to bump him to third outright on Michigan's all-time list. Horton broke free of his tie with Robbie Reid (1997-99), who previously held the third-place position with 160. In addition, Horton is currently third all-time in three-point field goal attempts with 473 total. He needs 12 to pass LaVell Blanchard (485, 2000-03) for second all time.

With one steal against Central Michigan (Nov. 18), Daniel Horton upped his career total to 124 steals. He currently holds ninth place on the all-time list, recently surpassing Jalen Rose (1991-94) who had ninth with 117. Horton needs just one more steal to reach Dugan Fife (1992-96) who currently holds eighth with 125 career steals.

SENIOR FORWARD CHRIS HUNTER

Chris Hunter was named one of four captains by his teammates for the 2005-06 season. He joins Lester Abram, Graham Brown and Sherrod Harrell as the program's first quad-captain appointment.

Chris Hunter saw his offensive production double in 2004-05 as he averaged 9.3 points per game. He averaged 5.4 as a freshman and 5.0 as a sophomore. He scored in double figures in 12 of his 23 games and had a career-high 22 points against High Point (Dec. 7).

Chris Hunter's career-high 22 points against High Point (Dec. 7, 2004) smashed his previous best of 13 set at Georgia Tech (Nov. 30, 2004). Hunter posed a threat to the Panthers after putting up 15 points in the first half and, as a result, was double-teamed in the second frame. Despite the disadvantage, Hunter was still able to put up seven points in the final 20 minutes to finish the contest with 22 points.

Chris Hunter continues to have the green light when it comes to the long-range shot. In the season-opener against Central Michigan (Nov. 18), he went 1-for-3 from long range. In 2004-05, he was 11-for-31 from the three-point line for a 35.5 percentage mark. For his career he is shooting 34.0 percent (16-for-47) from three-point land.

Chris Hunter continued to have success at the free throw line. In 23 games in 2004-05, Hunter shot 78.4 percent (58-for-74), including 38-for-47 (80.8) in his last 16 contests. To start off the 2005-06 season, he pick up right where he left off going 4-for-4 against Central Michigan (Nov. 18). In his career, he is shooting 73.5 percent from the charity stripe.

Chris Hunter has recorded at least one block in 42 of 76 career games, tallying 61 total blocks in his career. He had a career-best four swats

FIFTH-YEAR SENIOR GUARD TROY SANCHEZ

The Wolverines welcomed Troy Sanchez to the roster after he walked on in the October tryout period. He has spent the last two years as a Crisler Arena worker, who frequently could be found playing in pick-up games with the Wolverines during the summer and offseason months.

JUNIOR GUARD DION HARRIS

Dion Harris has played in 66 consecutive games for the Wolverines with 42 career starts. After starting just 11 games as a freshman, Harris received the starting nod in 30 games as a sophomore and started the season-opener against Central Michigan to begin his just season. In fact, since Lester Abram surrendered his starting position to Harris in 2003-04 with five games remaining, Harris has started in 39 of the last 40 games for the Maize and Blue.

With 13 points against Central Michigan, Dion Harris has 800 career points in his Michigan career. He needs just 200 more to become the 40th Wolverines to reach 1,000 career points. For his career he is averaging 12.1 points a game. He has scoring in double-figures in 45-of-66 career games. He has eight games with 20 or more points.

Dion Harris had a career-best 25 points against Iowa (March 5), after going 9-for-25 from the field, which included a career-best six three-point fields. He has eight career games with 20 or more points in a game.

Dion Harris has played 30-or-more minutes in 42 of 66 career games and he has reached 40 minute mark five times, including a career-high 44 against Arizona (Nov. 24, 2004) in the Preseason NIT semifinal.

With 130 of his 268 career field goals coming from beyond the arc, Dion Harris has produced 48.5 percent of his offense from long range. He has a career three-point percentage of 33.9 (130-for-383). His 130 triples currently ranks sixth all-time, while his 383 attempts are fifth.

Dion Harris is just five assists away from 200, as he has 195 career assists. He is averaging 2.9 assists per game in his career. As a sophomore, Harris recorded his first season with 100-plus assists after finishing with 109. He had a career-high of eight against UNC Asheville (Dec. 31, 2004).

JUNIOR FORWARD BRENT PETWAY

Michigan announced junior Brent Petway will miss the fall semester of the basketball season due to academic ineligibility. Petway will be allowed to practice but cannot participate in games during the first semester. Petway has played in 62 career games with five starts. He averaged 5.4 points, 4.4 rebounds and 1.2 blocks while shooting 60.4 percent from the field in his two seasons with the Wolverines.

Brent Petway underwent left shoulder surgery (May 2, 2005) following the 2004-05 season. After injuring the shoulder in high school, he aggravated the injury against Delaware State (Dec. 29, 2004). He wore a protective brace the remainder of the season. Following the season, he elected to have surgery to correct the injury and has made a full recovery.

Brent Petway showed his talents off the court at the annual student-athlete fund-raiser "Mock Rock," benefiting U-M's Mott's Children's Hospital. Petway brought the house down with his rendition of the rap song of Dem Franchize Boyz called "Tall T." He then broke out into a break-dance routine during his six-minute act. He received a perfect 50 from the judges to win the annual student-athlete competition. "Mock Rock" raised over \$10,000 for the hospital.

Prior to coming to Michigan and with his near 42-inch vertical leap, Brent Petway earned the nickname "Throw It Up" for his highlight reel dunks. Michigan's student section now calls Petway "Air Georgia" after thrilling the Crisler Arena crowd with his aerial shows.

Brent Petway is 142-for-235 for his career from the field for a 60.4 percentage mark. Of his 142 field goals, 73 of them have come via the dunk, for 51.4 percent of his offensive production coming above the rim.

Brent Petway had 47 blocks for a 1.6 per game average throughout the 2004-05 season. His total as a sophomore smashed the 28 he had as a freshman. He has 75 career swats, which is only three away from cracking into Michigan's all-time top 10. For his career he has recorded at least one block in 35 of 62 career games including 17 multi-block games.

JUNIOR FORWARD COURTNEY SIMS

Courtney Sims has played in 66 consecutive games for the Wolverines with 58 career starts. He started all 34 as a freshman, 23 as a sophomore and the season-opener against Central Michigan as a junior.

In the season-opener against Central Michigan, Courtney Sims finished the game with a game-high 20 points after a career-high nine field goals. He finished the game going 9-for-10 from the field, with six rebounds, two blocks and a steal. With that performance, he has back-to-back 20-plus point performances dating back to the last game of last season when Sims had a career-high 25 points against Northwestern in the Big Ten Tournament.

Courtney Sims is just 12 points away from reaching 600 for his career, as he has 588. In his career, he has scored in double figures in 28 of 66 games and is averaging 8.9 points per game. He has two games with 20 or more points in a game, including a career-high 25 points vs. Northwestern (March 10, 2005) in the first round of the Big Ten Tournament.

With his eight rebounds at Wisconsin (Feb. 16, 2005), Courtney Sims reached the 300-rebound mark in his young career. Sims has 327 career rebounds and has steadily improved his glass-work in each of his seasons -- 4.7 (2003-04), 5.2 (2004-05) and 6.0 (2005-06).

Courtney Sims had a career-best 15 rebounds against Purdue (Feb. 7, 2004) as a freshman. It marked the first time a Wolverine has recorded over 15 rebounds since the 1996 season when Maceo Baston (1995-98) had 15 against Texas in the NCAA Tournament. Sims currently has five career games with 10 or more rebounds.

Courtney Sims has led U-M in blocked shots in each of his first two seasons. As a sophomore, he had 52 blocks, and as a freshman, he led the Big Ten with 68. He has 122 career blocks, which puts him, sixth all-time. He needs just 28 blocks to become the fourth member of the U-M 150 block club.

With two blocks against Central Michigan (Nov. 18) Courtney Sims continues to slowly move

up Michigan's all-time blocks list. He is currently sixth all-time with 122 career blocks and needs 14 to catch Josh Asselin (136, 1997-2001). Sims has recorded at least one block in 56 of 66 games including 40 multi-block performances. Sims set a career-high with six blocks against Oakland (Nov. 21, 2003), which was his first collegiate game.

SOPHOMORE WING RON COLEMAN

Ron Coleman has been reunited with his high school teammate Jerret Smith. Both starred at nearby Romulus High School, playing together during the 2003-04 season. Together they went 17-5 overall advancing to the second round of the Class A State Championship playoffs.

With additional depth on the Wolverine roster, Ron Coleman will be seen playing both inside the post and on the perimeter. The jack-of-all-trades Coleman is shooting 38.5 percent from the field for his career and averaging 2.6 rebounds a game.

In the summer of 2005, Ron Coleman traveled with the Big Ten Foreign Touring Team throughout Spain. He averaged 13.0 points and 3.4 rebounds through the five-game tour.

After injuries depleted Michigan's perimeter last season, Ron Coleman was asked to do more than he was expected to in his first season with the Wolverines. He responded, averaging 7.5 points, 2.5 rebounds and 1.1 assists in 27.8 minutes per game. He has played in all 31 games with 24 starts.

Ron Coleman scored a career-best 18 points against Fairfield (Jan. 8, 2005). Coleman topped his previous best of 17 points, which he recorded against UNC Asheville (Dec. 31, 2004). He has scored in double figures in 12 of 32 career games.

Ron Coleman has proved he can come through in the clutch after he drained a career-best four three-point baskets in the final six minutes of play to help Michigan to a 66-62 victory at Penn State (Jan. 15). The freshman guard had been held scoreless for the entire first half before coming back to hit four triples in the second frame to help U-M to its third conference victory of the season.

FRESHMAN CENTER PHIL DEVRIES

Newcomer Phil DeVries is the fourth member of the Wolverines freshman class. The 6-10 shot blocker from Shelby Township has been a welcome addition to the team and will continue to work with the U-M practice squads. He chose to walk-on to Michigan rather than attending Central Michigan.

FRESHMAN FORWARD KENDRIC PRICE

Newcomer Kendric Price has been reunited with fellow Boston, Mass., native Courtney Sims. Both played against each other in the Independent School League during the 2003 season, as Price played a Buckingham Browne & Nichols School, while Sims played at Noble & Greenough School.

FRESHMAN WING JEVOHN SHEPHERD

Jevohn Shepherd saw his first collegiate action against Central Michigan. He finished the game with three points and a rebound in nine minutes of action.

Because of his leaping ability, fans have already dubbed Jevohn Shepherd as "Air Canada" after he came to Michigan from Toronto, Ontario, Canada. His dunking prowess has already been on display during the team warm-ups. He joins Brent "Air Georgia" Petway in the airplane nickname department.

Morris, Sims Sign with U-M During Early Signing Period

The University of Michigan men's basketball program received National Letters of Intent (Nov. 9) from two student-athletes on the first day of the early signing period: DeShawn Sims, a 6-8 forward from Detroit, Mich., and K'len Morris, a 6-4 wing from Grand Blanc, Mich.

Sims, who is a candidate for the 2005 Michigan's Hal Schram Mr. Basketball Award, has averaged 14.8 points, 8.8 rebounds and 2.0 blocks per game over the last three seasons at Pershing High School in Detroit. Sims was a 2005 Detroit News Dream Team and Associated Press and Detroit Free Press Class A All-State selection as a junior. He was also a Detroit News and Detroit Free Press All-Detroit and All-Metro first team selection.

Morris, who is also a candidate for the 2005 Michigan's Hal Schram Mr. Basketball Award, has averaged 12.9 points, 6.7 rebounds and 4.8 assists in his high school career. As a junior, Morris led Grand Blanc to its first regional game win since 1959 in the state playoffs and was an Associated Press and Detroit News Class A All-State selection after he scored 15-plus points in 18 of 25 games. He has also been an All-Big Nine Conference first team selection in 2005 and a third team selection in 2004.

TOMMY AMAKER'S MICHIGAN SEASON CAPSULES

2004-05: 13-18 overall; 4-12 Big Ten

In his fourth season, Amaker's Wolverines continued to show progress despite having a host of injuries causing nine different Wolverines to lose 86 total games during the season. Using 16 different starting lineups, U-M won 12 of its first 17 games and advanced to the Final Four of the Preseason NIT before injuries riddled the second half of the season. Dion Harris, who earned All-Big Ten honorable mention honors, blossomed in his second year playing all three perimeter positions, while leading the team in scoring, assists, steals and minutes. In addition, John Andrews, J.C. Mathis and Dani Wohl all earned Academic All-Big Ten honors for their work away from the hardwood.

2003-04: 23-11 overall; 8-8 Big Ten; 2004 NIT Champions

In his third season, Amaker led the Wolverines to a 23-11 record and the 2004 National Invitation Tournament title. The 20-plus win season was the first for the Wolverines since the 1997-98 season. The Wolverines defeated Rutgers 62-55 in the NIT championship game. The Maize and Blue finished 8-8 in the Big Ten regular season, getting the No. 5 seed in the Big Ten Tournament, earning just the third first-round bye in history. Several Wolverines earned postseason accolades including Daniel Horton's NIT MVP and All-Tournament selection. Bernard Robinson Jr., who was selected in the second round of the NBA Draft by the Charlotte Bobcats, and Lester Abram were named to the All-Big Ten third team, while Dion Harris and Courtney Sims, who was the first freshman to lead the Big Ten in blocked shots in eight years, were selected to the All-Freshman team. Harris also was named to the NIT All-Tournament team. Colin Dill, J.C. Mathis and Dani Wohl were all recognized on the All-Big Ten Academic Team.

2002-03: 18-12 overall; 10-6 Big Ten

In his second season, Amaker led the Wolverines to a 17-13 record, then its best finish in five years. With a 10-6 conference mark, U-M tied for third, garnering the No. 3 seed in the Big Ten Tournament, the program's highest-ever tournament seeding and earning the second, first-round bye ever. After starting 0-6, Amaker and his Wolverines turned the season around with a 13-game winning streak that tied for the fifth-best streak in Michigan history. Michigan also snapped an eight-game losing streak to Michigan State with a 60-58 victory over its in-state rival at Crisler Arena. He guided the Wolverines to numerous individual accolades in 2002-03. LaVell Blanchard earned All-Big Ten first team honors while Daniel Horton and Bernard Robinson Jr. were named to the second and third teams, respectively. In addition, Horton was named the Big Ten Freshman of the Year and to the inaugural All-Freshman team, while Colin Dill was named as an Academic All-Big Ten performer.

2001-02: 11-18 overall; 5-11 Big Ten

In his first season, Amaker led the Wolverines to an 11-18 overall record and a 5-11 mark in Big Ten play. The Maize and Blue were the No. 10 seed in the 2002 Big Ten Tournament and defeated No. 7 Northwestern, 72-51, in the first round before bowing out to No. 2 and eventual tournament champion Ohio State, 75-68, in the second round. The Wolverines set the single-season school record for free throw percentage with 75.4 percent, with four Wolverines averaging above 80 percent from the free throw line. The Wolverines also shot a school-record 32 three-point field goal attempts at Purdue (Feb. 13) at Mackey Arena, which bettered the previous record of 30 that was tied at Colorado State (Feb. 11). LaVell Blanchard was named to the All-Big Ten third team, while Ron Garber and Mike Gottfredson were each honored to the Academic All-Big Ten.

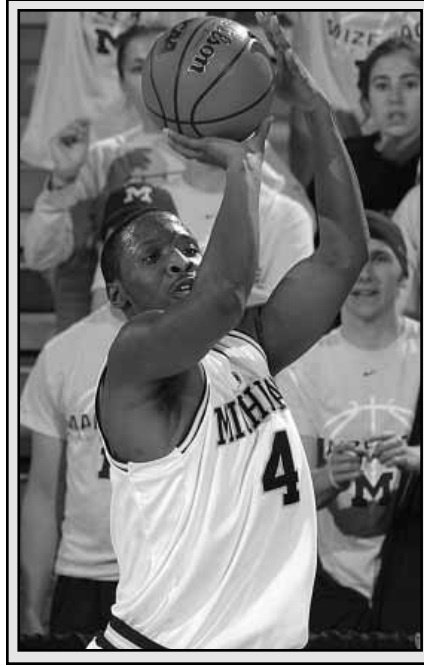

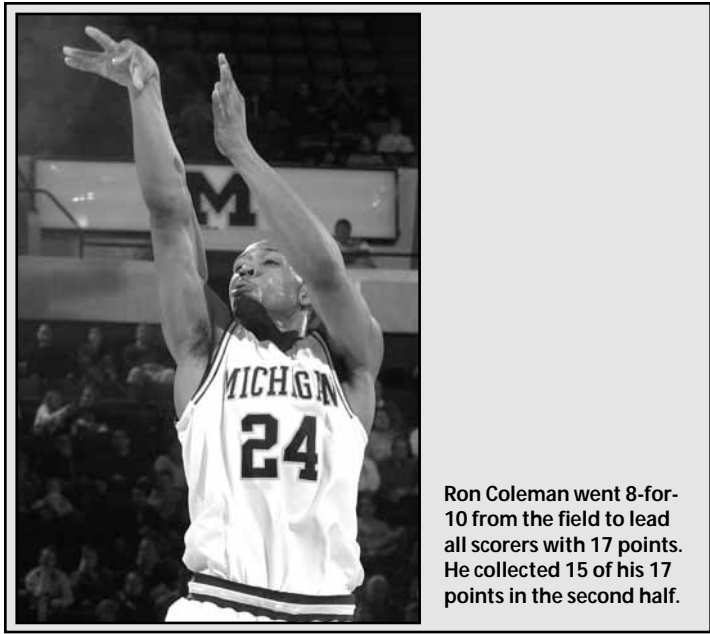
