Radio Coverage: The Michigan Sports Network is comprised of 27 stations. Frank Beckmann (play-by-play), Jim Brandstatter (analyst) and Steve Courtney (sideline reports) will originate the game on NewsTalk 760 WJR-AM in Detroit.

TV Coverage: ABC Sports will broadcast the game to a regional audience. Mike Tirico (play-by-play), Tim Brant (color commentary), Terry Bowden (color commentary) and Sam Ryan (sideline reports and analysis) will call the game.

Series History: Michigan and Miami (Ohio) will face each other on the gridiron for the fourth time at Michigan Stadium on Saturday. The Wolverines hold a 3-0 advantage in the all-time series, with the previous three games also being held at Michigan Stadium. Michigan has a perfect 17-0 record against schools currently playing in the Mid-American Conference, with victories against Eastern Michigan (6-0), Western Michigan (4-0), Miami of Ohio (3-0), Central Michigan (2-0), Bowling Green (1-0) and Buffalo (1-0). The Wolverines have played all 17 games against MAC schools at Michigan Stadium.

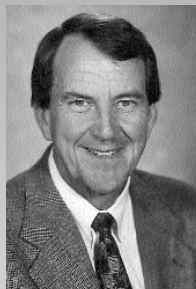

Last Meeting: #10 Michigan 31, Miami (Ohio) 13, Michigan Stadium, Sept. 1, 2001 -- The 10th-ranked Wolverines opened the 2001 season with a 31-13 victory over Miami (Ohio) at Michigan Stadium. In front of 109,676 fans, B.J. Askew and Calvin Bell had career days to lead Michigan to victory. Askew finished the game with then career highs in rushing attempts (20) and yards (94), while adding one rushing score and two receptions for 29 yards. Bell had career highs of five catches for 26 yards and two carries for 36 yards and tallied his first career touchdown. John Navarre finished 19-of-32 for 205 yards and one touchdown. The Wolverines held a 17-6 halftime advantage and extended the lead to 31-6 in the fourth before the RedHawks scored a late touchdown with eight seconds left in the game. Cornerback Jeremy LeSueur collected six tackles and one interception and safety Charles Drake picked up six stops to lead the U-M defense.

Did You Know?

The last non-televised University of Michigan football game was played against Miami (Ohio) on Sept. 30, 1995. Today's game with the Redhawks will be the 108th consecutive television broadcast for the Wolverines, second only to next week's opponent, Notre Dame, which holds a streak of 137 straight TV games (includes Sept. 4 opener at Brigham Young).

Lloyd Carr begins his 10th year as Michigan's head coach and his 25th overall season with the Wolverine program. The fifth-winningest active Division I-A coach with a .767 winning percentage, Carr has a 86-26 career record and an impressive 56-16 Big Ten Conference mark. He has a 57-18 record over the last six seasons (1998-2003) and has led the Wolverines to seven consecutive Jan. 1 bowl games. Carr was named the 1997 national coach of the year after guiding the program to a perfect 12-0 record and the *Associated Press* national championship. Carr led the Wolverines to back-to-back Big Ten Conference titles (1997-98) a share of the 2000 championship and the outright 2003 title. His teams have finished in the top 20 nationally each of his first nine years. Carr, previously a Michigan assistant coach for 15 years, began his college coaching career as a defensive backs coach at Eastern Michigan (1976-77) before joining Gary Moeller's staff at Illinois in the same role (1978-79). Carr came to Michigan in 1980 as Bo Schembechler's secondary coach. Carr served as defensive coordinator (1987-94) and was assistant head coach (1990-94).

Game Notes

U-M Ranked No. 7 (Coaches) and No. 8 (Media)

The University of Michigan football team will begin the 2004 season listed in the top 10 of both national polls. The Wolverines were No. 8 in the pre-season Associated Press media poll (Aug. 14), one spot lower than their No. 7 ranking in the first two ESPN/USA Today Coaches polls. The Wolverines received 1,223 points from the media after collecting 1,128 points from the coaches. U-M has been ranked in the top 10 of both national polls seven straight seasons. The Wolverines have appeared in the top 25 of the last 92 Associated Press polls, the longest streak in the nation, a streak that spans 70 games.

Michigan Opens 125th Season

The football program will begin its 125th season of college football action against Miami (Ohio) on Saturday, Sept. 4, at Michigan Stadium. The Wolverine program was established in 1879 when a group of 13 men fielded the first football team in school history and played a pair of off-campus games. U-M defeated Racine, 1-0, at White Stocking Park in Chicago, Ill., on May 30, 1879, for the first victory in school history. The Wolverines tied Toronto, 0-0, in Detroit to finish the year 1-0-1. U-M is starting its 122nd year of uninterrupted gridiron action, with 1882 being the only season that the program did not play any varsity games. The Wolverines are the sixth oldest football program in NCAA history (see chart below), but U-M has won more game than any team in college football history (833).

Michigan in Season Openers

The Wolverines enter the season opener against Miami (Ohio) with an impressive 103-18-3 record in their previous 124 openers. The Wolverines will play their 103rd season opener at home this Saturday and hold an 87-13-2 mark. Michigan enters the Miami (Ohio) game having won 10 consecutive season openers at Michigan Stadium, with its last loss coming against Notre Dame on Sept. 12, 1987 (26-7 loss).

Michigan vs. Miami (Ohio) in Season Openers

The Wolverines boast a 2-0 record against Miami (Ohio) in season openers. U-M defeated the RedHawks by a 31-13 score at Michigan Stadium on Sept. 1, 2001, the last meeting between the two programs. The only previous matchup came on Oct. 4, 1924, a 55-0 shutout for the Wolverines against the then Redskins.

Home Openers

The Wolverines have an 87-13-2 record all-time in home openers, including a 10-1 record at the "Big House" in the last 11 games. Michigan has won five straight home openers, with its last loss coming to Syracuse on Sept. 12, 1998 (38-28). U-M has faced a Mid-American Conference school in three of its past four season/home openers. The Wolverines are 9-0 all-time against the MAC in home openers.

Carr Begins 25th Season on U-M Sideline

Lloyd Carr reaches a milestone this year as he ties Fielding Yost for second all-time in terms of years spent coaching on Michigan's sideline. Only Bennie Oosterbaan with 31 years (11 as the head coach) has more service time. Carr over his first nine years as head coach has compiled an 86-26 record, including an impressive 56-16 in Big Ten games. He is also currently the winningest coach at Michigan Stadium by winning percentage. Carr has gone 52-6 at the Big House for an incredible winning percentage of .897. Carr has led the Wolverines to four Big Ten championships and the 1997 national championship in his nine seasons at the helm. His 15 years as an assistant were spent first as secondary coach, then defensive coordinator, then he added assistant head coach into his title for his final five years as an assistant.

Miami (Ohio) Connections

The Wolverine football program has a few longtime connections with the Miami (Ohio) RedHawks program. First, legendary Wolverine head coach **Bo Schembechler**, a 1951 alumnus of Miami (Ohio) and a member of the school's legendary Cradle of Coaches, was hired away from Miami (Ohio) on Dec. 24, 1968, to coach the Wolverines. Schembechler earned letters along the offensive line in 1949-50, and posted a 40-17-3 record as head coach of the then Redskins from 1963-68.

Longtime U-M equipment manager **Jon Falk** earned a degree in physical education from Miami (Ohio) in 1971 and was a student manager with the football and baseball teams during his undergraduate days. A native of Oxford, Ohio, Falk was an assistant equipment manager at Miami before accepting the head job at Michigan in 1974.

Current Miami (Ohio) athletic director **Brad Bates** is a 1981 graduate of the University of Michigan and a defensive back with the Wolverines from 1977-81. Bates was a member of three Big Ten Championship squads and played in three Rose Bowls and a Gator Bowl. He earned his bachelor's and master's degrees in education from Michigan and was a 1982 graduate assistant coach under Bo Schembechler. Bates' wife, Michelle, worked in U-M's Sports Information Office as a student.

Two of Schembechler's assistant coaches at Michigan had Miami (Ohio) connections and served both the Wolverine football program and later as administrators within the athletic department. **Jerry Hanlon**, a letterman at halfback in 1955 and a 1956 graduate of Miami (Ohio), came to Michigan

as offensive line coach with Schembechler in 1969. Hanlon coached the offensive line and quarterbacks during his tenure with the coaching staff (1969-91, and later moved into athletic development at Michigan (1992-2001). **Tirrel Burton**, a 1956 graduate and MU Hall of Fame running back, spent 21 years as Michigan's running back coach (1970-91) and became the school's first licensing and trademarks director.

Miami (Ohio) has a Winning Way

Michigan's opening opponent, the Miami RedHawks enter Ann Arbor with the nation's longest winning streak at 14 games. The RedHawks stretched their streak to 14 games with a 49-0 victory against Indiana State last weekend (Aug. 28). Led by departed star quarterback Ben Roethlisberger, Miami lost its first game in 2003 but rebounded with 13 straight wins, culminating in a 49-27 victory over Bowling Green in the MAC conference championship game and a 49-28 victory over Louisville in the GMAC Bowl. Miami finished ranked 10th in the nation in the AP poll, the highest a MAC team has ever finished in the poll.

Game Features Two of Nation's Top Punt Returners

Two of the nation's top punt returners will be on display in Michigan's season opener against Miami (Ohio). Steve Breaston had a breakout 2003 for the Wolverines, setting school records with 45 punt returns for 619 yards and two touchdowns. His 13.76 yards per punt return average was good for ninth in the nation. As good as Breaston was, Miami (Ohio) sophomore Ryne Robinson was even a little better. Last year as a freshman, Robinson returned 38 punts for 654 yards and three touchdowns. His 17.21 yards per punt return average was good for second in the nation, trailing only Louisiana State's Skyler Green.

Michigan vs. Mid-American Conference

With last year's 45-7 victory against Central Michigan, the Wolverines have registered an impressive 17-0 record against teams currently from the Mid-American Conference. U-M has outscored those schools by a 576-118 margin in those 17 games. This is the fifth consecutive year that Michigan has matched up with a MAC school.

Carr vs. MAC Schools

This will be the fifth consecutive year that Michigan hosts a Mid-American Conference school at Michigan Stadium. Carr has faced MAC schools seven times during his first nine years, facing both Miami (Ohio) and Western Michigan during the 2001 season. He has compiled a 7-0 mark and outscored the MAC schools by a 288-99 margin. Carr's teams have scored 30 or more points in all seven previous games.

Baas and Jackson Elected Captains

Lloyd Carr announced Aug. 19 that two seniors had been selected by their teammates as co-captains of the 2004 Wolverine football team. Fifth-year senior left guard **David Baas** (*Sarasota, Fla./Riverview HS*) represents the offense while senior cornerback **Marlin Jackson** (*Sharon, Pa./Sharon HS*) was the squad's defensive choice. They will work with a 32-member senior class to defend last season's Big Ten Conference title.

Michigan Tops Big Ten Preseason Poll

Defending Big Ten football champion Michigan was voted the preseason conference favorite in a poll of media members attending the Big Ten Media Day in Chicago, the league announced Aug. 4. Ohio State and Iowa, both U-M opponents in 2004, were second and third in the preseason poll. The Wolverines return 47 lettermen from last season, including 17 starters (seven offense, six defense, four specialists). The last time Michigan

received the conference's preseason nod to win the championship was 2000, a year in which the Wolverines solidified the media's selection with a 38-26 victory against Ohio State in Columbus to claim the title.

Michigan Looks for Second Straight Big Ten Title

Last year Michigan won the Big Ten title with a 7-1 conference record. It was the Wolverines' first conference championship since 2000. Michigan has a long history of winning back-to-back titles. In fact, they have created streaks of conference championships nine times. That includes three streaks of two titles in a row, one streak of three titles in a row, four streaks of four titles in a row, and from 1988-1992 Michigan won an incredible five Big Ten conference championships in a row.

Early Starts

Saturday's game against Miami (Ohio) will tie for the eighth earliest season opener in school history. Michigan's earliest opener was the thrilling 18-17 victory against Virginia in the 1995 Kickoff Classic played Aug. 26, 1995, at Michigan Stadium (Mercury Hayes caught a 15-yard TD pass from Scott Dreisbach as time expired). All 10 of the "early" games in school history have been played in the "Big House," with Michigan coming out on top in the first nine contests.

Strong Septembers Under Carr

Starting the season off strongly has been a trademark of U-M while under Lloyd Carr, posting a 29-6 record during the month of September. Carr won the first 10 September games of his career, and his teams have outscored the opposition by a 1,074-549 differential during the ninth month of the year. Carr is 23-1 at Michigan Stadium, 7-5 on the road and 9-6 against top 25 teams in September. Michigan has a 127-31-3 all-time record during the month of September.

Carr vs. Non-Conference

Lloyd Carr enters this season with an impressive 27-6 record against regular-season non-conference opponents. Carr has claimed victories in 17 of his last 21 contests against non-conference foes, and posted a 3-1 record last season. He won his first 10 career non-conference games before suffering back-to-back 1998 setbacks against Notre Dame (20-36) and Syracuse (28-38).

A Closer Look at Michigan's 2004 opponents

Michigan faces a tough challenge this year from its 11 opponents. In 2003 they had a combined record of 81-59 with seven bowl appearances. When you look at the seven teams that went to bowl games it is even more impressive as their combined 2003 record was 67-25. The teams with double-digit win totals last year that are on Michigan's schedule are: Miami (Ohio) 13-1, Iowa 10-3, Minnesota 10-3 and Ohio State 11-2. Michigan's opponents went 4-3 in bowls last season, highlighted by Ohio State's 35-28 win over Kansas State in the Fiesta Bowl, and Miami's 49-28 victory against Louisville in the GMAC Bowl.

U-M Looks to Extend Attendance Supremacy

The Wolverines enter 2004 having led the nation in attendance 29 out of the last 30 seasons, and they have a streak of 180 games with at least 100,000 fans at Michigan Stadium. U-M set a then NCAA single-season record of 745,139 fans in 1997, and with the expansion of the "Big House" in 1998 was able to set the single-game attendance record of 112,118 fans against Ohio State last season (Nov. 20, 2003).

Home Grown Talent

There are 48 players on this year's football roster who are continuing their gridiron careers in their home state of Michigan. Of these 48, four are returning starters and three are projected starters who will see significant playing time this season. **Markus Curry** (Detroit, Mich./Bishop Gallagher HS), **Braylon Edwards** (Detroit, Mich./Bishop Gallagher HS), **Matt Lentz** (Ortonville, Mich./Brandon HS), **Jake Long** (Lapeer, Mich./Lapeer East HS), **Larry Harrison** (Detroit, Mich./M.L. King HS), **Ernest Shazor** (Detroit, Mich./M.L. King HS) and **Gabe Watson** (Novi, Mich./Southfield HS) will all look to successfully represent their in-state hometowns by playing for the Wolverines this season.

Baas Anchors Offensive Line

David Baas enters 2004 looking to become the 11th player in Michigan football history to earn All-Big Ten first team honors at least three times during his career. He has been named to the watch lists for the Outland Trophy and Lombardi Award this season after collecting Associated Press All-America second team honors and his second straight first-team All-Big Ten selection last season. Baas is a three-year letterman and two-year starter at left guard. He has played in 32 career games and made 27 consecutive starts. He received 2004 preseason All-America honors from The Sporting News, Lindy's Magazine, Athlon Sports Magazine, Rivals.com, CollegeFootballNews.com and Blue Ribbon Yearbook.

Jackson Returns to Corner; Seeks 30th PBU

Marlin Jackson returns to cornerback in 2004 after switching to free safety during the Wolverines' 2003 Big Ten championship season. A 2002 All-America at cornerback, Jackson has played in 33 career games including 27 starts, and ranks third all-time with 29 career pass breakups. Jackson leads all defensive players in career tackles (148), interceptions (eight for 43 yards, 1 TD) and pass breakups (29). He has been named to the watch list for the Jim Thorpe Award, presented annually to the nation's outstanding defensive back. Jackson has been named to 2004 preseason All-America teams by Playboy Magazine, The Sporting News, Lindy's Magazine, Rivals.com, Blue Ribbon Yearbook and CollegeFootballNews.com.

Edwards Seeks Rare Feat

Senior wide receiver **Braylon Edwards** (Detroit, Mich./Bishop Gallagher HS) enters 2004 looking to become the first player in Big Ten history and the ninth player in Division I-A football history to surpass the 1,000-yard receiving mark three times during his career. Edwards gained 1,035 yards in 2002 and collected 1,138 last season to put himself in position to achieve the rare feat (see list below).

Edwards Approaches Top of Record Books

Braylon Edwards is quickly approaching the top of Michigan career receiving categories as the season opens. He ranks third all-time in receptions with 155, trailing only Marquise Walker (176) and Anthony Carter (161). With 14 TDs caught this season, Edwards, who is tied for third with 24 career TD receptions, can pass Carter's school record of 37. Edwards also will look to increase his standing on the career receiving yards list. He has 2,211 yards, which puts him sixth at the moment, and with 866 yards this season he will pass Carter for number one on the school's list. Edwards has hauled in at least one reception in 26 straight games, tied for the third-best string with a reception in Michigan history. He has 10 career 100-yard receiving games. A two-year letterman and starter at wide receiver, Edwards has played in 32 career games and made 24 starts.

Edwards Grabs Preseason Attention

Braylon Edwards' play the past two seasons has provided considerable awards recognition entering the 2004 season. A first-team All-Big Ten selection last season, Edwards is a candidate for both the Walter Camp Player of the Year Award and Biletnikoff Award presented to the nation's top wide receiver this season. He has been named to every first-team pre-season All-America squad for the upcoming year.

Reid Tackles Everything in Sight

Senior inside linebacker **Lawrence Reid** (*Pickerington, Ohio/Pickerington HS*) hopes to build on a 2003 performance where he led the team in tackles. Reid had 82 tackles a year ago, giving him 95 tackles for his career. That performance won him the Roger Zatkoff Award, which is given annually to Michigan's top linebacker. He started all 13 games in 2003, and contributed six tackles for loss, one sack, two fumble recoveries and three PBUs in addition to his team-leading tackle total. Reid earned All-Big Ten honorable mention from both the coaches and the media last season. He has been named to the watch list for the 2004 Butkus Award by the Downtown Athletic Club of Orlando, Fla.

Taking Them to the Wood Shop

Senior outside linebacker **Pierre Woods** (*Cleveland, Ohio/Glenville HS*) is looking for a strong 2004 campaign after leading the Wolverines in tackles for loss (14) and sacks (seven). In his first year as a starter last year, Woods registered career highs in tackles (68), TFLs and sacks, and contributed one fumble recovery and one PBU. He has appeared in 26 career games, with 13 career starts (all in 2003), and has tallied 75 stops. His solid 2003 campaign earned him All-Big Ten second team honors from the coaches, and All-Big Ten honorable mention from the media. Woods has been named to the watch lists for both the Butkus Award and Nagurski Award, which is given annually to the best defensive player in college football regardless of position, by the Football Writers Association of America.

Shazor Looks to Take Charge in Secondary

Senior strong safety **Ernest Shazor** (*Detroit, Mich./Martin Luther King HS*) returns as the starter at strong safety in 2004. He has been named to the watch list for the 2004 Jim Thorpe Award presented to the nation's outside defensive back and will also challenge for All-America honors. In 2003, Shazor was third on the team with 57 tackles, including eight tackles for loss, two sacks, two interceptions, one forced fumble and five PBUs. That all-around play earned him All-Big Ten second team honors from the coaches and All-Big Ten honorable mention from the media. Shazor has played in 23 career games with 11 starts, and has registered 82 tackles, nine tackles for loss, three sacks, two interceptions and nine pass breakups during that time.

Finley Makes Mark in Michigan Punting Record Book

Senior punter **Adam Finley** (*Greenwood, Ind./Center Grove HS*) will end his career after this upcoming season as one of the top punters in Michigan history. In 28 career games, Finley has punted 126 times for 5,202 yards (41.2 avg.), with 16 boots over 50 yards and 35 punts knocked down inside the opposition's 20-yard line. Both stats are eighth all-time on the respective Michigan career lists. Finley lists eight in career punts and yardage, and is second in average with 41.2 yards per punt. Monte Robbins holds the record with a 42.8-yard career average. For the third straight year Finley is a Ray Guy award candidate, which is given to the college football's best punter, and he is also a candidate for All-Big Ten and All-America honors.

Rivas Returns After Solid Freshman Year

Sophomore placekicker **Garrett Rivas** (*Tampa, Fla./Jesuit HS*) provided the Wolverines with the answer to their kicking game. He finished third on team with 77 points, trailing Chris Perry and Braylon Edwards a season ago. He was 50 for 51 on extra point attempts and connected on 75 percent of his field goals (nine of 12). His career-long field goal is 47 yards. Rivas is also a candidate for the Lou Groza Award, which is given to college football's best kicker.

- U-M is in its 125th year on the gridiron.
- Michigan ranks first all-time in Division 1-A wins with 833.
- The Wolverines rank first in all-time all-Division wins with 833.
- Michigan is the winningest overall athletic program in Big Ten Conference history.
- The Wolverines rank second in all-time winning percentage (.746).
- Michigan has 332 television appearances, the most of any college football program in NCAA history.
- U-M has compiled a 221-103-8 record when appearing on television.
- Michigan has appeared in 107 consecutive televised games.
- Michigan's 41 Big Ten Conference titles are the most of any college football program in any conference.
- U-M is fifth all-time with 11 national titles.
- U-M has had 254 players named All-Big Ten Conference first team a total of 361 times, the most of any conference school.
- Michigan lists fourth all-time in NCAA history with 69 consensus All-American selections.
- Three Michigan players – Tom Harmon, Desmond Howard, Charles Woodson have won the Heisman Memorial Trophy.
- Michigan has an overall all-time record of 833-272-36 (.746).

MICHIGAN STADIUM

- Michigan Stadium is in its 78th season as the home of U-M football.
- U-M has drawn in excess of 100,000-plus fans to 180 consecutive home games.
- U-M has led the nation in attendance 29 of the last 30 seasons.
- 38,208,151 fans have watched the Wolverines over the years at Michigan Stadium.
- Michigan has compiled a 351-103-5 record (.764) at Michigan Stadium.
- The Wolverines have had 67 winning seasons in 77 years at Michigan Stadium.
- Michigan has the largest college-owned stadium with a capacity of 107,501.
- Michigan's largest stadium crowd was 112,118 in 2003 vs. Ohio State, the NCAA regular-season record.
- Michigan Stadium has had consecutive crowds of 100,000 or more since 1975.

BOWL HISTORY

- The Wolverines' streak of 29 straight bowl games is the second longest current streak in NCAA history.
- Michigan ranks ninth in NCAA history with 35 all-time bowl appearances.
- U-M is tied for 11th in all-time bowl victories (18).
- Michigan has appeared in more Rose Bowls (18) than any other Big Ten Conference school.
- The Wolverines have won four consecutive bowl games on two different occasions.
- Michigan has appeared 24 times since 1975 on Jan. 1 or Jan. 2, the year the Big Ten allowed more than just the champion to go to bowls.
- U-M beat Stanford 49-0 on Jan. 1, 1902, to win the first-ever Rose Bowl.
- Michigan has an overall bowl record of 18-17.

NATIONAL POLLS

- U-M has appeared in the top 25 of the last 92 Associated Press polls, the longest streak in the nation, a streak that spans 70 games.
- U-M has been ranked in every poll for the past four seasons and has been listed in the national rankings every time since Oct. 24, 1998.
- Since the preseason 1988 poll, U-M has been ranked in every poll but three in 1993 and four in 1998.
- The Wolverines have been ranked in the top 25 for all but four of Lloyd Carr's 112 career games (all during the 1998 season).
- Since the preseason 1988 poll, U-M has been listed in every poll except three in 1993 and four in 1998.
- Michigan has been listed in the top 10 of the polls 57 times during Carr's tenure.
- U-M ranks No. 1 all-time in composite AP final football polls (1936-2003), passing Notre Dame for the top spot after last season's No. 6 final ranking.
- The Wolverines have finished in the top 10 of the AP poll 36 times since its inception in 1936.
- Michigan has finished in the final top 25 rankings 52 times since the inception of the AP poll in 1936.
- Michigan has been ranked in the final Associated Press top 25 poll the last 19 years and has been listed in the final rankings 34 of the last 36 years (was not ranked in 1984 and did not receive a final AP ranking in 1982).

BIG TEN CONFERENCE

- U-M ranks first in all-time Big Ten football titles with 41.
- The Michigan football program is the only Big Ten team in any sport to win a conference title in each decade.
- Michigan has won or shared 20 Big Ten titles since 1969, including two conference crowns in the 2000s.
- The Wolverines have had 254 players named All-Big Ten Conference first team a total of 361 times, the most of any conference school.
- Michigan has won 22 consecutive Big Ten openers and 35 of the last 36.
- U-M has an overall record of 474-167-23 (.731) vs. Big Ten opponents.

WOLVERINES IN THE NFL

- The Wolverines had 58 former players in 2004 NFL Training Camps.
- Michigan has placed 270 former players onto NFL rosters, including 40 players active in 2003.
- U-M lists fifth all-time with 39 first-round NFL draft picks.
- A total of 10 Michigan players have been selected in the top 10 of the NFL Draft.
- A total of 36 former U-M players have made 51 Super Bowl appearances.
- Two Wolverines have been selected Super Bowl MVP's: Desmond Howard and Tom Brady (twice).
- Wolverines have made 69 appearances in the NFL Pro Bowl.
- Six former Wolverines have been enshrined in the NFL Hall of Fame: George Allen, Tom Mack, Dan Dierdorf, Len Ford, Bill Hewitt and Elroy Hirsch.
