Radio Coverage: The Michigan Sports Network is comprised of 29 stations. Frank Beckmann (play-by-play), Jim Brandstatter (analyst) and Steve Courtney (sideline reports) will originate the game on NewsTalk 760 WJR-AM in Detroit.

TV Coverage: ABC Sports will broadcast the game to a regional audience. Terry Gannon (play-by-play), Jamal Anderson (color commentary) and Dave LaMont (sideline reports and analysis) will call the game.

Series History: This will be the first meeting.

Michigan vs. MAC Schools: The Michigan football team is undefeated in 18 meetings against Mid-American Conference schools, with victories against Eastern Michigan (6-0), Western Michigan (4-0), Miami of Ohio (4-0), Central Michigan (2-0), Bowling Green (1-0) and Buffalo (1-0). All 18 of the Wolverines' victories against MAC schools have come at Michigan Stadium. Lloyd Carr has an 8-0 mark against MAC schools.

Season Openers: The Wolverines enter the season opener against Northern Illinois with an impressive 104-18-3 record in their previous 125 openers. The Wolverines will play their 104th season opener at home this Saturday and hold an 88-13-2 mark. Michigan enters the Northern Illinois game having won 11 consecutive season openers at Michigan Stadium, with its last loss coming against Notre Dame on Sept. 12, 1987 (26-7 loss).

Home Openers: The Wolverines have a 104-16-2 record all-time in home openers, including an 11-1 record at the "Big House" in the last 12 games. Michigan has won six straight home openers, with its last loss coming to Syracuse on Sept. 12, 1998 (38-28). U-M has faced a Mid-American Conference school in four of its past five season/home openers. The Wolverines are 10-0 all-time against the MAC in home openers.

Did You Know?

-- Michigan begins its 100th season of competition in the Big Ten Conference. The Wolverines have compiled an impressive 443-160-18 record in conference play during those 99 seasons and have claimed a league-leading 42 championships. U-M also leads the conference with 371 first-team All-Big Ten selections.

-- Michigan head coach Lloyd Carr and Northern Illinois head coach Joe Novak were members of former Wolverine head coach Gary Moeller's staff at Illinois during the 1978 and 1979 seasons. Carr coached the defensive backs and Novak was the defensive line mentor. Novak also has ties to the Michigan program, having played defensive end for legendary coach Bo Schembechler at Miami University. He later served as a graduate assistant for Schembechler at Miami.

Lloyd Carr is in his 11th year as Michigan's head coach and his 26th overall season with the Wolverine program. The fourth-winningest active Division I-A coach with a .766 winning percentage, Carr has a 95-29 career record and an impressive 63-17 Big Ten Conference mark. He has guided the program to five Big Ten titles in the last eight years (1997-98-2000-03-04) and has led the Wolverines to nine consecutive Jan. 1 bowl games. Carr was named the 1997 national coach of the year after guiding the program to a perfect 12-0 record and the *Associated Press* national championship. Carr led the Wolverines to back-to-back Big Ten Conference titles (1997-98), a share of the 2000 championship and back-to-back conference crowns in 2003 and 2004. His teams have finished in the top 20 nationally each of his first 10 years. Carr, previously a Michigan assistant coach for 15 years, began his college coaching career as a defensive backs coach at Eastern Michigan (1976-77) before joining Gary Moeller's staff at Illinois in the same role (1978-79). Carr came to Michigan in 1980 as Bo Schembechler's secondary coach. Carr served as defensive coordinator (1987-94) and was elevated to assistant head coach for five seasons under Moeller (1990-94).

U-M Ranked Fourth in Preseason National Polls

The University of Michigan football team opens the 2005 season with a consensus No. 4 preseason ranking in the nation's oldest national polls, following its Aug. 20 selection by the Associated Press and the Wolverines' previous listing in the USA Today Coaches poll (Aug. 5).

The two-time defending national champion Southern California Trojans are the top-ranked squad in both polls. The Trojans are followed in the top five by No. 2 Texas, No. 3 Tennessee, the Wolverines and No. 5 Louisiana State in the AP poll. The only change in the top five of the coaches poll is at No. 5 where Oklahoma received the spot ahead of the LSU Tigers.

Associated Press Poll Notes:

- U-M has been ranked in every poll for the past six seasons and has been listed in the national rankings every time since Oct. 24, 1998, the longest streak in the nation.
- The Wolverines have been ranked in the top 25 for all but four of Lloyd Carr's 124 career games (all during the 1998 season).
- Since the preseason 1988 poll, U-M has been listed in every poll except three in 1993 and four in 1998.
- Michigan has been listed in the top 10 of the polls 58 times during Carr's tenure.
- U-M ranks No. 1 all-time in composite AP final football polls (1936-2004).
- The Wolverines have finished in the top 10 of the AP poll 36 times since its inception in 1936.
- Michigan has finished in the final top 25 rankings 53 times since the inception of the AP poll in 1936.
- U-M has finished in the top 25 rankings each of the past 20 seasons and 35 of the past 36 years (was not ranked in 1984 and did not receive a final AP ranking in 1982).
- Michigan has the most weekly appearances in the AP poll, appearing 712 times entering the 2005 season (including preseason poll).

109 Consecutive Weeks in AP Poll

The Wolverines enters the 2005 season with the nation's longest active streak of AP poll appearances (109), 20 polls longer than second-place Miami (Fla.). U-M has been ranked in every poll for the past six seasons and has been listed in the national rankings every time since Oct. 25, 1998. The Wolverines have been ranked in the top 25 for all but four of Lloyd Carr's 125 career games (all during the 1998 season).

U-M vs. NIU Game Notes

Michigan vs. Mid-American Conference

With last year's 43-10 victory against Miami (Ohio), the Wolverines have registered an impressive 18-0 record against teams currently from the Mid-American Conference. U-M has outscored those schools by a 619-128 margin in those 18 games. This is the sixth consecutive year that Michigan has matched up with a MAC school.

Carr vs. MAC Schools

This will be the sixth consecutive year that Michigan hosts a Mid-American Conference school at Michigan Stadium. Carr has faced MAC schools eight times during his first 10 years, facing both Miami (Ohio) and Western Michigan during the 2001 season. He has compiled an 8-0 mark and outscored the MAC schools by a 331-109 margin. Carr's teams have scored 30 or more points in all eight previous games.

Michigan Tops Big Ten Preseason Media Poll

Michigan was selected as the preseason favorite to win the Big Ten Conference in a poll of the media attending the 34th annual Big Ten Kickoff Event and Media Days held Aug. 1-2 at the Hyatt Regency Chicago. The Wolverines edged No. 2 Ohio State and 2004 co-champion and No. 3 Iowa for the preseason top honor. U-M received the preseason nod for the fourth time in head coach Lloyd Carr's tenure and has been ranked among the top three in all 11 of his seasons. Michigan has fulfilled the media's prediction on two of the three previous occasions (2000, 2004).

Wolverines Seek Third Consecutive Big Ten Title

The Michigan Wolverines enter 2005 looking to capture their third straight conference championship. The Wolverines have a long history of winning consecutive crowns. In fact, they have created streaks of conference championships 10 times. That includes four streaks of two titles in a row (including back-to-back titles in 2003-04), one streak of three titles in a row, four streaks of four titles in a row, and from 1988-92 Michigan won an incredible five Big Ten conference championships in a row.

Michigan Begins 126th Season of Gridiron Action

Michigan will begin its 126th football season Saturday against Northern Illinois. The Wolverine program was established in 1879 when a group of 13 men fielded the first football team in school history and played a pair of off-campus games. U-M defeated Racine, 1-0, at White Stocking Park in Chicago, Ill., on May 30, 1879, for the first victory in school history. The Wolverines tied Toronto, 0-0, in Detroit to finish the year 1-0-1. U-M is starting its 123rd year of uninterrupted gridiron action, with 1882 being the only season that the program did not play any varsity games. The Wolverines are the sixth oldest football program in NCAA history.

Carr to Coach 125th Career Game

Lloyd Carr will roam the sidelines in his 125th career game as U-M head coach when the Wolverines face Northern Illinois Saturday. Carr has compiled a 95-29 record in his 124 career games at Michigan, including a 63-17 mark in Big Ten games. Carr has claimed eight or more victories in each of his first 10 seasons and won at least 10 games in half of those seasons.

Carr Nears 100th Victory

Lloyd Carr begins the 2005 season five victories shy of 100 in his career. He could join Fielding Y. Yost (165-29-10) and Bo Schembechler (194-48-5) as the only Wolverine coaches to reach the century mark in career victories. Carr could become the 11th coach in Big Ten history to amass 100 victories at his institution.

Carr in Elite Company

By winning the 2004 Big Ten title, Lloyd Carr became the eighth coach in conference history to claim five or more Big Ten championships during his head coaching career. He joined Michigan coaches Fielding H. Yost and Bo Schembechler among the elite list of conference coaches to claim at least five titles. Carr is the active career leader in Big Ten wins, boasting a 17-1 record in conference play, and his teams have not finished below third in the league in the past eight years.

Early Starts

Saturday's game against Northern Illinois will tie for the seventh earliest season opener in school history. Michigan's earliest opener was the thrilling 18-17 victory against Virginia in the 1995 Kickoff Classic played Aug. 26, 1995, at Michigan Stadium (Mercury Hayes caught a 15-yard TD pass from Scott Dreisbach as time expired). All 11 of the "early" games in school history have been played in the "Big House," with Michigan coming out on top in the first 10 contests.

Strong Septembers Under Carr

Starting the season off strongly has been a trademark of U-M while under **Lloyd Carr**, posting a 32-7 record during the month of September. Carr won the first 10 September games of his career, and his teams have outscored the opposition by a 1,191-625 differential during the ninth month of the year. Carr is 26-1 at Michigan Stadium, 7-6 on the road and 9-6 against top 25 teams in September. Michigan has a 130-32-3 all-time record during the month of September.

Carr vs. Non-Conference

Lloyd Carr enters this season with an impressive 29-7 record against regular-season non-conference opponents. Carr has claimed victories in 19 of his last 24 contests against non-conference foes, including a 2-1 record last season. He won his first 10 career non-conference games before suffering back-to-back 1998 setbacks against Notre Dame (20-36) and Syracuse (28-38).

U-M Looks to Extend Attendance Supremacy

The Wolverines enter 2005 having led the nation in attendance 30 out of the last 31 seasons, and they have a streak of 186 games with at least 100,000 fans at Michigan Stadium. U-M set a then NCAA single-season record of 745,139 fans in 1997, and with the expansion of the "Big House" in 1998 was able to set the single-game attendance record of 112,118 fans against Ohio State two years ago (Nov. 20, 2003).

Home FieldTurf Advantage

The Wolverines have compiled an impressive 13-0 home record since the installation of FieldTurf at Michigan Stadium prior to the 2003 football season. Michigan had a 6-0 record in 2004 and posted a 7-0 mark during its inaugural season on the surface during the 2003 season.

Home Winning Streak at 15 Games

Michigan enters 2005 with a 15-game winning streak at Michigan Stadium. In addition to 13 wins in the past two seasons, Michigan defeated Wisconsin and Michigan State after its last defeat, a 34-9 loss to eventual Big Ten champion Iowa on Oct. 26, 2002.

Michigan's Past Five Seasons

The Wolverines boast one of the nation's best records over the past five seasons at 46-16 (.742). In that time span, U-M has two 10-win seasons and has victories in two bowl games: 2001 Citrus and 2003 Outback bowls. The Wolverines have finished in the top 10 of the national poll twice during that five-year stretch and have ranked among the top 20 each season.

U-M Among Winningest Programs Since 1997

The Wolverines are the winningest program in college football and have been one of the most dominant teams nationally since their 1997 national championship season. Michigan is tops in the Big Ten Conference in total wins since 1997 and ranks fourth nationally with a 78-21 record (.788) over the last eight years, including five seasons with 10 or more wins.

Nation's Leader in Wins and Winning Percentage

The Michigan football program enters the 2005 season looking to extend its lead in all-time NCAA Division I-A victories and winning percentage. The Wolverines have compiled an 842-275-36 record during their first 125 seasons of gridiron action. Notre Dame is 802-263-42 in its history. Michigan passed Notre Dame during the 2004 season for the best winning percentage in college football history. Michigan has a winning percentage of .7458803 compared to a .7434507 for Notre Dame. Michigan's 842 victories are the most of any institution in all divisions of college football.

Home Grown Talent

There are 51 players on this year's football roster who are continuing their gridiron careers in their home state of Michigan. Of these 51, five are returning starters and nine are projected starters who will see significant playing time this season.

Avant, Massey Elected Captains of 2005 Team

University of Michigan head football coach **Lloyd Carr** announced Aug. 21 that fifth-year senior defensive tackle **Pat Massey** (*Brecksville, Ohio/St. Ignatius HS*) and fourth-year senior wide receiver **Jason Avant** (*Chicago, Ill./Carver HS*) have been selected by their teammates as captains of the 126th Wolverine football team. Massey was selected as the defensive captain and Avant will represent the offensive side of the ball. Michigan will continue to name a special teams captain each week.

Captains Notes:

- Avant is the first wide receiver selected captain during Lloyd Carr's tenure.
- The last wide receiver to be elected captain was Walter Smith in 1994.
- Avant is the third wide receiver to become captain since Bo Schembechler became head coach in 1969, joining Smith and Anthony Carter (1982).
- Avant is the first Illinois native selected captain during Carr's head coaching career.
- Massey is the fifth defensive lineman selected captain during Carr's tenure, joining Grant Bowman (2003), Eric Wilson (2000), Rob Renes (1999) and Juaquin Feazell (1998).
- Massey is the third Ohio native named captain for the Wolverines during Carr's coaching career, joining 2002 co-defensive captains Grant Bowman and Carl Diggs.
- Head coach Bo Schembechler introduced co-captains at Michigan in 1970.

Avant Approaches 100 Career Receptions

A Biletnikoff Award candidate, Jason Avant is a three-year letterman and the team's active career leader in every receiving category. He leads the squad with 87 receptions for 1,240 yards (14.3 avg.) and five receiving touchdowns. Avant needs 13 catches to become the 13th player in Michigan history to reach 100 receptions during his career. A two-time Academic All-Big Ten selection and second-team All-Big Ten selection by the coaches, Avant has caught at least one pass in 23 consecutive games played.

Hart Nears 1,500 Career Rushing Yards

The Big Ten's top returning rusher from a year ago, sophomore tailback **Mike Hart** (*Syracuse, N.Y./Onondaga Central HS*) needs 45 rushing yards against Northern Illinois to become the 27th running back in Michigan history to eclipse 1,500 career rushing yards. Hart set a U-M record and rushed for the second-most yards for a freshman in Big Ten history, carrying 282 times for 1,455 yards and nine touchdowns. The Big Ten Freshman of the Year and an All-Big Ten first team selection, Hart has been named to the watch list for the 2005 Doak Walker Award.

Hart Protecting the Pigskin

Mike Hart enters the 2005 season with 252 offensive touches without a fumble. He carried the ball 230 times and added 22 receptions in eight-plus games following his only career miscue. The only time Hart fumbled the ball in 2004 was on a running play near the Iowa end zone during the fourth quarter of the Big Ten opener (Sept. 25).

Henne Charting Top of U-M Record Book

Sophomore quarterback **Chad Henne** (*Wyomissing, Pa./Wilson HS*) enters his second year as a starter already among the top 10 quarterbacks statistically in Michigan history. He ranks ninth in career pass completions (240), tied for ninth in touchdown passes (25), 10th in passing attempts (399), and needs just 203 passing yards against Northern Illinois to jump into the top 10 in yardage. Henne's 2,743 passing yards in 2004 are the third-most in U-M history for a season while his 25 touchdown passes tied the school mark set by Elvis Grbac in 1991.

Henne Looks to Keep TD Streak Alive

A Davey O'Brien Award and Maxwell Award candidate, **Chad Henne** begins 2005 having thrown at least one touchdown pass in all 12 career games and registered eight multi-touchdown passing games. Henne has thrown for at least 200 yards in seven of his 12 starts, including career-best 328-yard efforts at Indiana and Ohio State a year ago.

Fifth-year senior right guard **Matt Lentz** (*Ortonville, Mich./Brandon HS*) begins his third season as a starter along the offensive line for the Wolverines. He has started 25 consecutive games at right guard and earned All-Big Ten first team honors from the coaches in 2004. He is a candidate for the Outland Trophy and Lombardi Award this season.

Breaston Holds U-M Punt Return Mark

Steve Breaston enters 2005 with Michigan's career punt return yardage mark (911) and is 10 returns shy of breaking Anthony Carter's punt return attempts record of 79 set from 1979-82. Breaston ranks among the top punt returners in U-M and Big Ten history in just 24 career games, returning 69 punts for a school-record 911 yards and three touchdowns. He is second in punt returns and tied for second in punt return TDs in Michigan's career annals to go along with the school yardage mark. He scored two touchdowns on punt returns in 2003 and has 13 career 20-yard-plus punt returns.

Breaston Climbs Big Ten Punt Return Chart

Steve Breaston heads into the 2005 season 89 punt return yards shy of 1,000 career yards. He is looking to become the seventh player in Big Ten history to eclipse 1,000 career punt return yards. Breaston is 436 yards shy of Jim Leonhard's Big Ten punt return record.

Breaston Looks to Step Up at Wideout

Steve Breaston looks to step into the starting wide receiver spot vacated by All-America and Biletnikoff Award winner Braylon Edwards this season. The team's third leading receiver last season, Breaston caught 34 passes for 291 yards and snared two touchdowns. He has at least one catch in 21 of his 24 career games and begins the 2005 season with 72 career receptions for 735 yards and six touchdowns.

Stenavich Paces Team in Career Starts

Fifth-year senior left tackle **Adam Stenavich** (*Marshfield, Wis./Marshfield HS*) enters 2005 as the team's active career leader in starts with 27 assignments. Stenavich leads fellow offensive linemate Matt Lentz by two games and co-captain Pat Massey by six contests. Stenavich started all but the Rose Bowl game against Texas last year and started all 13 games in 2003. He made his first career start at right guard against Illinois on Sept. 28, 2002, and finished the season with seven appearances and three starts. Stenavich is a returning All-Big Ten first team selection by the coaches in 2004.

Top Notch Tight End Trio

Michigan could boast the best tight end corps in the country with a trio consisting of fifth-year senior **Tim Massaquoi** (*Allentown, Pa./Parkland HS*), senior **Tyler Ecker** (*El Dorado Hills, Calif./Oak Ridge HS*) and sophomore **Mike Massey** (*Brecksville, Ohio/St. Ignatius HS*). Massaquoi and Ecker combined for 35 receptions for 341 yards and two touchdowns last season, not including Massaquoi's reception for the two-point conversion against Michigan State. An All-Big Ten first team selection in 2004, Massaquoi hauled in 18 passes for 184 yards. He has been named to the watch list for the 2005 Mackey Award, presented to the nation's outstanding tight end.

Rivas Named to Groza List

A Lou Groza Award candidate, junior kicker **Garrett Rivas** (*Tampa, Fla./Jesuit HS*) enters the 2005 season having connected on a career-best seven consecutive field goal attempts. Rivas is second in Michigan history with a career field goal percentage of 77.8 percent, connecting on 28-of-36 attempts. He is sixth in field goals scored (28) and seventh in field goal attempts (36).

Rivas Among Top 20 in Scoring

Garrett Rivas lists 19th all-time in scoring at Michigan with 171 career points in just two seasons. He collected 94 points in 2004, hitting 19-of-24 field goals and 37 PATs, after tallying 77 points as a true freshman during the 2003 season. Rivas is seventh among U-M kickers in points scored and needs five points in the opener to climb into the top 15.

Massey Leads Defense in Starts

Pat Massey enters 2005 with a team-leading 21 starts on defense, recording 65 career tackles, 15 tackles for loss, nine sacks and four pass breakups. The team's active career leader in sacks (nine), Massey is a three-year letterman who can play both defensive tackle and end. He started all 12 games at defensive end in 2004, tallying a career-best 37 tackles, five sacks and one pass breakup. Massey also blocked two field goal attempts last season.

Woodley Nears Century Mark in Stops

Junior rush linebacker **LaMarr Woodley** (*Saginaw, Mich./Saginaw HS*) enters the Northern Illinois game seven tackles shy of 100 in his career. He has 93 stops in 25 career games, including 20 tackles for loss, five sacks and four pass breakups. A Butkus Award candidate, Woodley is the team's top returning tackler from a year ago. Woodley started 10 of the team's 12 games at outside linebacker in 2004, recording a career-best 70 tackles, 16 TFLs and four sacks.

Woods Seeks 100th Career Tackle

Fifth-year senior outside linebacker **Pierre Woods** (*Cleveland, Ohio/Glenville HS*) seeks his 100th career stop in the season-opener against Northern Illinois. Woods has posted 97 career stops, including 16 tackles for loss, seven sacks and two fumble recoveries. He contributed 22 tackles and two TFLs during an injury-riddled 2004 campaign after setting career highs with 68 stops, 14 TFLs and seven sacks in 2003. Woods has played in 38 career games and made 17 starts.

Watson Anchors Middle of D

Senior nose tackle **Gabe Watson** (*Novi, Mich./Southfield HS*) begins the 2005 season looking to team with co-captain Pat Massey in the middle of the Wolverines defensive line. Watson was a force to be reckoned with last season, collecting career highs in tackles (37), tackles for loss (seven) and sacks (two) while forcing one fumble. Watson was a first-team All-Big Ten selection by the coaches in 2004 and has been named to the watch lists for five college football individual awards this season (Outland, Lombardi, Nagurski, Bednarik and Lott). He has started 11 career games, all last season, and played in 33 contests, recording 52 tackles, eight TFLs and two sacks.

Hall Monitors Secondary

Junior cornerback **Leon Hall** (*Vista, Calif./Vista HS*) enters 2005 as the team's top veteran in the defensive secondary. Hall has started 12 games at cornerback and played in all 25 career contests, contributing 74 stops, two tackles for loss, one sack and two fumble recoveries. He is the team's top active career leader with five interceptions and 16 pass breakups. Hall started nine of the 12 games last season, setting career highs with 48 tackles and 10 PBUs. He has collected pass breakups in 10 of his last 17 career games.

University of Michigan Director of Athletics Bill Martin announced Aug. 23 the early season adjustments to the Wolverines' 2006 football schedule.

"We appreciate the efforts made by Central Michigan and Athletic Director Herb Deromedi to make possible the addition of Ball State to our schedule," Martin said. "I know our coaches look forward to hosting former coach Brady Hoke."

Michigan will open the 2006 slate against Ball State on Sept. 2 and Central Michigan has agreed to move back a week to Sept. 9. The Chippewas were originally scheduled to face the Wolverines' Sept. 2.

Former U-M defensive line coach Brady Hoke, head coach at Ball State, will bring his Cardinals into Michigan Stadium for the first-ever meeting between the two programs. Central Michigan will make its third appearance against the Wolverines, with both previous contests being played at the Big House (1931, 2003).

Michigan has made no determination on an opponent for a 12th football game in 2006, the first season that the NCAA allowed for an additional game.

- U-M has had 260 players named All-Big Ten Conference first team a total of 371 times, the most of any conference school.
- Michigan lists fourth all-time in NCAA history with 73 consensus All-American selections.
- Three Michigan players – Tom Harmon, Desmond Howard, Charles Woodson have won the Heisman Memorial Trophy.
- Michigan has an overall all-time record of 842-275-36 (.7458803).

MICHIGAN STADIUM

- Michigan Stadium is in its 79th season as the home of U-M football.
- U-M has drawn in excess of 100,000-plus fans to 186 consecutive home games.
- U-M has led the nation in attendance 30 of the last 31 seasons.
- 38,874,300 fans have watched the Wolverines over the years at Michigan Stadium.
- Michigan has compiled a 357-103-15 record (.773) at Michigan Stadium.
- The Wolverines have had 68 winning seasons in 78 years at Michigan Stadium.
- Michigan has the largest college-owned stadium with a capacity of 107,501.
- Michigan's largest stadium crowd was 112,118 in 2003 vs. Ohio State, the NCAA regular-season record.
- Michigan Stadium has had consecutive crowds of 100,000 or more since 1975.

BOWL HISTORY

- The Wolverines' streak of 30 straight bowl games is the nation's longest current streak in NCAA history.
- Michigan ranks ninth in NCAA history with 36 all-time bowl appearances.
- U-M is tied for 11th in all-time bowl victories (18).
- Michigan has appeared in more Rose Bowls (18) than any other Big Ten Conference school.
- The Wolverines have won four consecutive bowl games on two different occasions.
- Michigan has appeared 25 times on Jan. 1 or Jan. 2 since 1975, the year the Big Ten allowed more than just the champion to go to bowls.
- U-M beat Stanford 49-0 on Jan. 1, 1902, to win the first-ever Rose Bowl.
- Michigan has an overall bowl record of 18-18.

NATIONAL POLLS

- The Wolverines have the most weekly appearances in the AP poll, appearing 712 times since 1936.
- Michigan has appeared in the top 25 of the last 109 Associated Press polls, the longest streak in the nation, a streak that spans 84 games.
- U-M has been ranked in every poll for the past six seasons and has been listed in the national rankings every time since Oct. 25, 1998.
- Since the preseason 1988 poll, U-M has been ranked in every poll but three in 1993 and four in 1998.
- The Wolverines have been ranked in the top 25 for all but four of Lloyd Carr's 124 career games (all during the 1998 season).
- Since the preseason 1988 poll, U-M has been listed in every poll except three in 1993 and four in 1998.
- Michigan has been listed in the top 10 of the polls 61 times during Carr's tenure.
- U-M ranks No. 1 all-time in composite AP final football polls (1936-2004).
- The Wolverines have finished in the top 10 of the AP poll 36 times since its inception in 1936.
- Michigan has finished in the final top 25 rankings 53 times since the inception of the AP poll in 1936.
- Michigan has been ranked in the final Associated Press top 25 poll the last 20 years and has been listed in the final rankings 35 of the last 37 years (was not ranked in 1984 and did not receive a final AP ranking in 1982).

- U-M ranks first in all-time Big Ten football titles with 42.
- The Michigan football program is the only Big Ten team in any sport to win a conference title in each decade.
- Michigan has won or shared 20 Big Ten titles since 1969, including three conference crowns in the 2000s.
- The Wolverines have had 260 players named All-Big Ten Conference first team a total of 371 times, the most of any conference school.
- At least one Michigan player has received All-Big Ten first team honors each of the past 42 seasons.
- The Wolverines have received 87 Player of the Week honors since the conference began handing out the award in 1987, including 52 of those honors during Lloyd Carr's coaching tenure.

- Two Wolverines have been selected Super Bowl MVPs: Desmond Howard and Tom Brady (twice).
